Investment Objective

The Trust's Investment Objective is to provide shareholders with a balanced portfolio of investments in the Asia Pacific region. The Trust's portfolio is outsourced to two managers, Aberdeen Asset Management and Nomura Asset Management, each managing Asia cum Japan mandates aiming to outperform the MSCI AC Asia Pacific Free Index (£). Aberdeen is more focused on stock-picking and generally has a lower weight in Japan. By contrast, Nomura has a more diversified approach, paying more attention to regional weightings within the benchmark index. The aim of employing this combined approach is to smooth out the volatility associated with a single manager. The result of their independent judgments is that the trust has active weightings that are very different from the index, as shown in the table below.

Monthly Commentary

Most Asian markets fell during the first half of June amid recurring fears over the sustainability of the global recovery. Sentiment was dented by economic data from the US and China, along with uncertainty over Greece's debt problems. However equity markets rebounded towards the month-end as the Greek Parliament passed a vote to impose new austerity measures that should free up more EU funding.

Headwinds have buffeted the Asia Pacific markets periodically during the first 6 months of 2011, many of the problems emanating from the West. Domestically the Asian economies face diametrically opposite problems – their economies are growing too rapidly with adverse inflationary implications. As a result many countries, most notably China and India, have tightened monetary policy. As the year progresses these domestic headwinds look likely to ease which should result in renewed strength for Asian markets.

During June Witan Pacific's NAV rose by 1.5% on a total return basis versus the benchmark's return of 1.8%. Over the past 12 months to end June Witan Pacific has returned 16.8% in NAV total return terms, outperforming its benchmark by 2.5%.

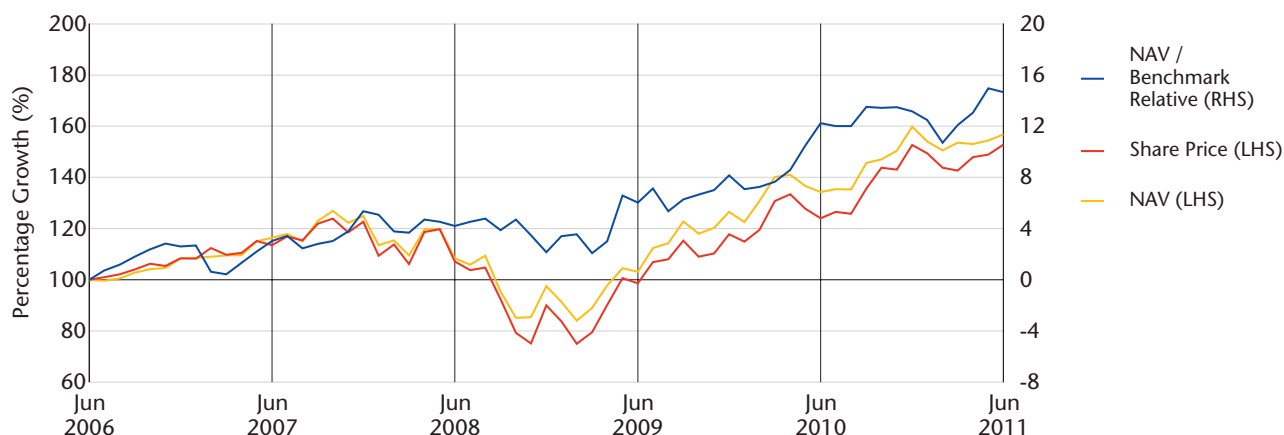
